### Call for abstracts

#### THE LEGACY OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

University of Leicester – 31 January 2019

We invite proposals of early career researchers for papers at the conference on *'The Legacy of the League of Nations'* to be held at Leicester Law School on 31 January 2019.

The League of Nations is the first 'great experiment' in international organisation. Created in 1919 to replace the rule of force with the rule of law in international relations, it is the first attempt in history to create an institutional machinery aimed at securing a world without war. The aim of the conference is to critically assess the legacy of the League of Nations and the role of its successor, the United Nations, as a driving force for the development of international law

We welcome submissions that engage with various aspects of the work of the League of Nations. Doctrinal and interdisciplinary papers are equally welcome. Possible topics for the conference include, but are not limited to:

- The League of Nations and the theory of sources of international law
- The legacy of the Permanent Court of International Justice
- The past, present and future of collective security
- The League of Nations and the protection of refugees
- The League of Nations and the development of international organisations law
- The Covenant and the Charter: the seeds of international constitutionalism?
- Rethinking the United Nations in the twenty-first century: lessons learnt from the League of Nations' experience and proposals for the future
