







# Summer School "Business and Human Rights"

II Edition - A.Y. 2018/2019

# **CALL FOR APPLICATIONS**

## ART. 1

Human Rights International Corner ETS (HRIC), in collaboration with the Sant'Anna School of Advanced Studies, University of Milan - Department of Italian and Supranational Public Law, and CNR-IRISS, is offering a Summer School in "Business and Human Rights". The Summer School will be held at Temple University Rome's campus in Rome, from 24<sup>th</sup> to 28<sup>th</sup> June 2019. The Summer School received the endorsement of the Inter-Ministerial Committee on Human Rights (CIDU).

#### ART. 2

The focus of the Summer School is on providing a frame of understanding of the main challenges concerningthe intersection between business activities and human rights, with particular attention to the role and obligations of States, to recent and emerging human rights-related legislation regulating corporate activitiesworldwide, and to the access to effective remedies for victims of corporate-related human rights abuses. The Summer School will provide the participants with up-to-date insights into the business and human rights international debate, analysing in depth the content and implications of the UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights and introducing the audience to the current discussion of an international business and human rights treaty.

In line with the polycentric governance system underpinning the UN Guiding Principles, the three Modules of the Summer School concern, respectively, the State duty to protect human rights (I), the corporate responsibility to respect human rights (II) and the victims' access to remedy (III). The Summer School aims at providing academics, students, NGO workers, lawyers, CSR experts and otherpublic- and private-sector practitioners with essential knowledge and tools to operating in the field of business and human rights keeping up with current relevant developments at the national, regional and international level.

### ART. 3

The sessions are spread over five days, from Monday to Friday, and require participants' full-time commitment.

The content is divided into 3 modules:

- Module I: The State Duty to Protect Human Rights
- Module II: The Corporate Responsibility to Respect Human Rights
- Module III: The Right of Victims of Abuses to Access Effective Remedies.

The working language of the Summer School is English.









#### ART. 4

The Summer School addresses the needs of professionals such as students, researchers, lawyers, NGOworkers, CSR specialists, public- and private-sector practitioners and similar. In order to be eligible for thecourse, applicants must meet the following minimum requirement:

Having a working knowledge of English (self-certification is admissible).

A Selection Committee will assess and score the applications received as per the methodology and criteriadetailed in art. 6. The Summer School will accept a maximum of 40 participants and will be activated with a minimum of 17 participants. The organizers, based on financial availability, retain the right to activate the course with aninferior number of participants.

# ART. 5

The admission procedure will be held in one single round. The application deadline is 25<sup>th</sup>April 2019. Applications received before March 15<sup>th</sup>, 2019, will benefit from the early-bird registration fee. Applications received after April 25<sup>th</sup> will not be given consideration. - 1. Application form, specifying:
  - a. Surname, name, place and date of birth, citizenship
  - b. Address and contact details for any communication
  - c. Knowledge of English
  - d. Statement of Purpose
- 2. The applicant's CV/résumé

In case of failure of the online application system, applicants are advised to contact the Summer School Secretariat at: <a href="mailto:bhrsummerschool@gmail.com">bhrsummerschool@gmail.com</a>. Late applications, or applications missing any mandatory information will not be taken into consideration. Forged deeds and false statements shall be punished in accordance with the Criminal Code and any otherapplicable law and will result in exclusion from the Summer School.

# ART. 6

The admission procedure includes an assessment of the applicants' qualifications. Only applicants who have the minimum requirements detailed at Art. 4 above will be considered eligible for the Summer School. A Selection Committee will select the applicants by awarding up to 70 points to their qualifications, based onthe following criteria:

- 1. Academic background and relevant trainings (including BA, MA, PhD, short courses, etc.): up to 23 points
- 2. Relevant work experiences (incl. volunteering experiences): up to 20 points









# 3. Statement of purpose: up to 27 points

Only applicants who receive an overall score of at least 40/70 points will be considered eligible for the course. At the end of the procedure, the organizers will prepare the list of admitted candidates and the reserve list:both lists will be published on the HRIC website. The results will be timely notified to admitted applicants via email.

#### ART. 7

The Summer School fee is 690,00 EUR and includes membership to HRIC, attendance costs, tutorship, reference materials, access to thelibrary of Temple University Rome, and free access to the wireless connection within the University's premises. A discounted early-bird registration fee, amounting to 590,00 EUR, will apply to all applications received before March  $15_{th}$ , 2019. Accommodation in Rome is the full responsibility of the participants. Any other expenses – such as visa and travel costs, etc. – are to be covered by the participants.

## ART. 8

Admitted applicants who wish to attend the Summer School shall give confirmation of their acceptance bythe deadline indicated in the admission letter. To confirm, they shall send by email (bhrsummerschool@gmail.com) the receipt of payment of the full Summer School fee. Payment can be made through bank transfer to the following account:

Admitted students who are citizens of non-EU countries residing outside Italy, as soon as they receivenotification of admission, shall contact the Italian Embassy in their country of residence (for the addressesplease see: <a href="http://www.esteri.it/MAE/EN/Home.htm">http://www.esteri.it/MAE/EN/Home.htm</a>) in order to apply for a short-term visa for studypurposes. HRIC will support the visa application of the participant by sending an official letter to thecompetent Embassy.









Admitted participants who withdraw from the Summer School after payment of the tuition fee might bereimbursed if their withdrawal is based on serious and documented reasons and if the Summer School'sbudget so allows. Participants who have diligently applied to the competent Embassy without undue delaybut have been refused their visa will normally receive reimbursement of the tuition fee that they have paid.

In accordance with art. 9 paragraph 2 of Decree No 68/2012, students with disabilities greater than or equal to 66%, recognized pursuant to art. 3, paragraph 1, of Law 104/1992, are exempted from payment of the tuition fee. A reduction of 1.5% for each percentage point of disability is applied to those students with disabilities less than 66%. Students with disabilities who intend to make use of the exemption or reduction of the tuition fee will be asked to submit certification of their disability upon admission to the Summer School.

### Art. 9

At the end of the Summer School those participants who have attended at least 80% of the classes willreceive a Certificate of Attendance.
